A RESOLUTION BY COUNCILMEMBER ANTONIO BROWN

A RESOLUTION AMENDING RESOLUTION 20-R-3002 TO PRIORITIZE GRANTING LOCALITIES THE ABILITY TO EMPLOY RENT STABILIZATION STRATEGIES OVER RENT CONTROL AND REQUESTING THE GEORGIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO CONVENE A STUDY COMMITTEE TO EXPLORE THE IMPACT OF GRANTING LOCALITIES THE ABILITY TO INSTITUTE RENT STABILIZATION WITHIN THEIR JURISDICTIONS AND TO ALLOW CARVE OUTS FOR CERTAIN VULNERABLE POPULATIONS; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, Resolution 20-R-3002, adopted by the Atlanta City Council on January 21, 2020, requested the Georgia General Assembly to repeal their prohibition on the ability of counties or municipalities from controlling or regulating rent to be charged for privately owned single-family or multiple-unit residential rental properties and to review their policies on rental properties for the purpose of promoting equity and affordability to those residing within the state of Georgia; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to §44-7-19 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, "No county or municipal corporation may enact, maintain, or enforce any ordinance or resolution which would regulate in any way the amount of rent to be charged for privately owned, single-family or multiple-unit residential rental property. This Code section shall not be construed as prohibiting any county or municipal corporation, or any authority created by a county or municipal corporation for that purpose, from regulating in any way property belonging to such county, such municipal corporation, or such authority from entering into any agreements with private persons, which agreements regulate the amount of rent to be charged for such rental properties."; and

WHEREAS, while rent control has its benefits by capping rent at a certain amount, rent stabilization takes into consideration market rates and the health of the local economy, making it a more powerful and beneficial tool for localities;

WHEREAS, additionally, allowing localities to create carve outs for certain vulnerable populations, such as those over the age of 65, disabled persons, and veterans, who are often exploited by unscrupulous landlords, could reduce homelessness and increase economic prosperity by providing opportunities for these groups to have access to sustainable, long-term housing; and

WHEREAS, these complex housing issues, which are preempted by the State and limit a local government's ability to provide equitable housing opportunities for its residents, would be best addressed by a study committee to explore the impact of granting local governments authority over this area.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA HEREBY RESOLVES that Resolution 20-R-3002 be amended to prioritize granting localities the ability to employ rent stabilization strategies over rent control.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Atlanta City Council requests the Georgia General Assembly to convene a study committee to explore the impact of granting localities the ability to institute rent stabilization within their jurisdictions and to allow carve outs for certain vulnerable populations such as people aged over 65, the disabled, and veterans.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon passage of this resolution, the Municipal Clerk shall provide copies to Governor Brian Kemp and all the members of the Georgia General Assembly.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that all resolutions and parts of resolutions, in conflict herewith are hereby waived to the extent of the conflict.

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA IN IMPLEMENTING INITIATIVES DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC TO ENSURE THE WELL-BEING OF ATLANTA PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES, STUDENTS AND OTHER FAMILIES IMPACTED BY SCHOOL CLOSURES DURING THIS PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, cities around the nation are responding to an outbreak of a respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus that was first detected in China and which has now been detected in more than 100 locations internationally, including in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the virus has been identified as "Coronavirus Disease 2019" (abbreviated "COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, on Wednesday, March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization ("WHO") declared the rapidly spreading coronavirus outbreak a pandemic, acknowledging that the virus will likely spread to all countries on the globe; and

WHEREAS, following the declaration by WHO, on March 11, 2020, Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms signed an Administrative Order halting the disconnection of water service for the City's customers over the next 60 days because of the imperative nature of access to clean, running water is at this time; and

WHEREAS, on Friday, March 13, 2020, Mayor Bottoms took further action and instituted a telecommute policy for all non-essential, City employees, until March 31, 2020, in an effort to stop the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on Friday, March 13, 2020, the Atlanta Public Schools also announced the closure of all schools indefinitely and required all students and employees to stay home; and

WHEREAS, the public health measures, including the suspension of employment and other services and activities in an effort to stop the spread of COVID-19 have already proven to have a negative effect on the economy and have caused unanticipated financial burdens as people experience loss of work and income; and

WHEREAS, many families who have children attending Atlanta Public Schools will be forced to stay home to care for their children, and as result may experience loss of work and income which will have a direct effect on their ability to pay rent and meet monthly household expenses; and

WHEREAS, additionally, the Atlanta Public School students will be tasked with online homework and assignments; and

WHEREAS, virtual or remote instruction will be a viable solution to replace in-person instruction and help students maintain educational levels, but many low-income students may lack access to broadband, hindering their ability to participate remotely; and

WHEREAS, Councilmembers Marci Collier Overstreet, Matt Westmoreland and Andre Dickens serve as members of the Atlanta Public Schools Joint Committee and their duty is to foster joint initiatives to better the quality of life and education of all employees, families and students of Atlanta Public Schools; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that the Atlanta City Council support Mayor Bottoms in implementing additional initiatives that will sustain the health, safety and welfare of all employees, students and families of the Atlanta Public Schools during this health emergency; and

WHEREAS, as the City receives Federal grants, these funds should be utilized to provide assistance to Atlanta Public School employees, families, and other residents impacted by COVID-19, in the form of rental subsidies and assistance to relieve overall household financial burdens; and

WHEREAS, the City has a cable franchise agreement with Comcast, every effort should be made to leverage this relationship so that free broadband access is provided to all Atlanta Public School employees, families and other households impacted during the school closures.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA that the Atlanta City Council commends Mayor Bottoms for her efforts in addressing the COVID-19 public health emergency and supports her efforts to implement additional procedures to protect the health, safety and welfare of Atlanta Public School employees, student and families impacted by school closures during this public health emergency.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Atlanta City Council supports the Mayor extending the halt on the disconnection of water services for City residents past the 60-day time period if the COVID-19 public health emergency continues.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Atlanta City Council supports the Mayor exploring efforts to use Federal grants to provide assistance to Atlanta Public School employees, families and other residents impacted by COVID-19, in the form of rental subsidies and assistance to relieve overall household financial burdens; and

WHEREAS, cities around the nation are responding to an outbreak of a respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus that was first detected in China and which has now been detected in more than 100 locations internationally, including in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the virus has been identified as "Coronavirus Disease 2019" (abbreviated "COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, on Wednesday, March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization ("WHO") declared the rapidly spreading coronavirus outbreak a pandemic, acknowledging that the virus will likely spread to all countries on the globe; and

WHEREAS, in response to the increase of COVID-19 infections in the state of Georgia, government offices, including the City of Atlanta, have temporarily implemented teleworking procedures in the interest of public safety; and

WHEREAS, the spread of the coronavirus has forced the closure of at least 46,000 schools, nationwide including Atlanta Public Schools; and

WHEREAS, while the school closures are a necessary precaution to slow the spread of the virus, the closures may adversely affect Atlanta Public School parents who will have to take time off from work to care for their children; and

WHEREAS, the school closures will particularly impact low-income students, who rely on school meals for lunch; and

WHEREAS, the impact of COVID-19 has been unprecedented and the Atlanta City Council believe it is important during this national emergency to support initiatives that will serve to sustain the health, safety and welfare of all employees, families, and students of the Atlanta Public Schools and other residents; and

WHEREAS, Councilmembers Marci Collier Overstreet, Matt Westmoreland and Andre Dickens serve as members of the Atlanta Public Schools Joint Committee, their duty is to foster joint initiatives to better the quality of life and education of all employees, families and students of Atlanta Public Schools; and

WHEREAS, it is therefore imperative that the Atlanta City Council urge the Offices of the State of Georgia and all our local businesses to partner with the City to support initiatives that will help to cushion the impact the COVID-19 pandemic will have on Atlanta Public School employees, students, families, and other residents.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA that the State of Georgia, Georgia Power, and the Atlanta business community work in partnership with the City of Atlanta to collectively offer assistance to help minimize the impact disruptions the school closures will have on the Atlanta Public Schools employees, students, families and other residents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Atlanta City Council urges the State of Georgia to authorize the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program ("SNAP") to provide food stamps for 30 days to all families in the Atlanta Public school districts which have been closed to stop the spread of COVID-19.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Atlanta City Council commends Georgia Power for temporarily suspending power disconnections for 30 days so as to provide families who have been affected by COVID-19 with critical access to electricity and that they closely monitor the situation to extend the suspension, as needed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Atlanta City Council urges its business community to protect the job status of all employees with children affected by the school closures and that landlords suspend any eviction proceedings for 30 days to accommodate for the suspension of employment instituted to stop the spread of COVID-19.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon adoption of this resolution the Municipal Clerk shall provide copies of this to Governor Brian Kemp, the Georgia General Assembly, Georgia Power, the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, the Atlanta Apartment Association, and all businesses holding a business license issued by the City of Atlanta.

A RESOLUTION URGING GOVERNOR BRIAN KEMP ("GOVERNOR") TO USE HIS EMERGENCY POWERS TO ENACT A STATEWIDE TEMPORARY PROHIBITION ON PUBLIC ASSEMBLAGES, EVENTS, AND GATHERINGS OF 50 OR MORE PEOPLE FOR A PERIOD OF NO LESS THAN EIGHT WEEKS; REQUESTING THAT THE GOVERNOR PLACE A TEMPORARY PROHIBITION ON THE OPERATIONS OF BARS AND RESTAURANTS WITH OCCUPANCIES IN EXCESS OF 50 OR MORE PEOPLE; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, COVID-19, a new and contagious coronavirus, has spread at a rate and across such a wide area that it has been declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization; and

WHEREAS, the severity is such that the President of the United States, the Governor, as well as Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms ("Mayor") have each declared states of emergency in their respective jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") stated in a March 15, 2020 Guidance that for the succeeding eight weeks, in-person events, assemblages, or gatherings that consist of 50 or more people be cancelled in an effort to stem the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, acting within the scope of her emergency powers, pursuant to Section 2-181 of the Code of the City of Atlanta, the Mayor issued Executive Order 2020-07 on March 16, 2020, which places a temporary prohibition on gatherings of 50 or more within the City of Atlanta ("City"); and

WHEREAS, the CDC stated that restaurants, bars, and other public establishments should not allow occupancy to exceed 50 people, patrons should avoid being closer than six feet from one another, and take-out and delivery options are to be utilized where possible; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor issued Executive Order 2020-08, which limits approved occupancy at bars, nightclubs, restaurants, gyms and fitness centers, movie theaters, live performance venues, bowling alleys, arcades, and private social clubs to 50 with exemptions for hospitals, nursing homes, and similar facilities; and

WHEREAS, in its capacity as a safeguard of the welfare and public health of the citizens of the City, the Atlanta City Council ("City Council") lauds these bold but necessary Executive Orders; and

WHEREAS, similar policies, enacted statewide, would further the public good in addressing this pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia General Assembly ratified the Governor's public health emergency declaration on March 16, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the City Council would therefore be desirous to see some form of the policies sanctioned through Executive Orders 2020-07 and 2020-08 apply to all Georgians; and

WHEREAS, the City Council encourages the Governor to use his emergency powers to enact such a measure in an effort to limit the impact of COVID-19 on our city and state.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA HEREBY RESOLVES, that the Governor of the State of Georgia is urged to use his emergency powers to temporarily prohibit public assemblages, events, and gatherings of 50 or more people.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the City Council requests that the Governor enact a concurring ban on the operation of bars and restaurants at an occupancy in excess of 50 people, with guidelines that patrons are to remain six feet apart as well as ordering via delivery or takeout services where possible.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that upon adoption of this Resolution, the Municipal Clerk shall transmit copies to the Governor and all members of the Georgia General Assembly.

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a new and contagious disease caused by a novel coronavirus, that has not previously been seen in humans, which commonly causes upper-respiratory tract illnesses; and

WHEREAS, the world has experienced a deep humanitarian crisis with more than 120,000 cases and more than 4,000 deaths due to the COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is officially a global pandemic according to the World Health Organization ("WHO"); and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic is causing financial and economic hardships around the world, including to global stock markets, businesses, and local economies; and

WHEREAS, President Donald Trump has declared a national emergency for the United States of America in response to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, Dallas Fort Worth International Airport, John F. Kennedy International Airport, and San Francisco International Airport are all considering reducing rent for concessionaires at their airports in response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic is a potential economic crisis for businesses at the Airport, which may disrupt future services to the Airport customers; and

WHEREAS, the recommended public health measures in response to stopping the spread of COVID-19 are severely impacting businesses throughout the country and, as a result, employees are experiencing reduced hours of work and ultimately, a loss in wages and the City of Atlanta authorizing a suspension of the Minimum Annual Guarantee (MAG) for all of its Concessions and Car Rental Lease Agreements will allow Airport businesses to stay open during this pandemic and pay their trained and able employees; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a competitive procurement process conducted in accordance with the City's Code of Ordinances, the City entered into Concessions Lease Agreements with various concessionaires ("Concessions Agreements"); and

WHEREAS, the City has decided it is in the best interest of the City to provide immediate, but temporary, rental payment relief to all concessionaires at the Airport due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the traveling public and the City to maintain concessions business at the Airport during the COVID-19 pandemic and immediately thereafter; and

WHEREAS, to respond to the potential catastrophic economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on the Airport, it is recommended that the rent requirement in the Concessions Agreements be temporarily reduced by suspending the Minimum Annual Guarantee payment obligation in the Concessions and Consolidated Car Rental Agreements effective March 1, 2020 for a period of four (4) months ending on June 30, 2020 ("Initial Relief Period"); and

WHEREAS, during the Initial Relief Period, concessionaires will only be required to pay the percentage rent as defined in each current Concessions Agreements; and

WHEREAS, the City may, at its sole discretion, extend the temporary rental payment relief by an additional thirty (30) days beyond the Initial Relief Period if the COVID-19 pandemic has not subsided.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA, that the Mayor, or her designee, is authorized on behalf of the City of Atlanta to execute an amendment to all Concessions and Consolidated Car Rental Lease Agreements with the City at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport to modify and amend the Concessions and Consolidated Car Rental Lease Agreements by adding the following language, with all other terms of the Agreements remaining the same:

• Temporary Emergency Rental Payments: The City may, at its sole discretion, temporarily reduce Concessionaire's and/or Car Rental Company rental requirement by suspending the Minimum Annual Guarantee payment obligation in the Concessions and/or Consolidated Car Rental Agreements for a period of four (4) months ending on June 30, 2020 and requiring Concessionaire and/or Car Rental Company to pay the percentage rent as defined in each Concessions and Consolidated Car Rental Lease Agreement in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. At the expiration of the initial four (4) month period, the City may extend this Temporary Emergency Rental Payment for an additional thirty (30) day period, at its sole discretion, if the COVID-19 Pandemic is still active and it is in the best interest of the City. Once the initial and/or extended Emergency Rental Payment term expires, Concessionaire is required to resume rental payments as outlined in the Rental Payment section of the Concessions and/or Consolidated Car Rental Agreement. The Temporary Emergency Rental Payment supersedes any language in the Concessions Lease and Consolidated Car Rental Agreements regarding the reduction of rent due to changes in enplanements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Attorney is directed to prepare any necessary documentation, including amendments to the agreements, to evidence the City of Atlanta's consent

of the amendments all Concessions Lease and/or Consolidated Car Rental Agreements with the City at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport for execution by the Mayor or her designee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said amendment shall not become binding upon the City, and the City shall incur no obligation or liability until same has been signed by the Mayor, attested to be the Municipal Clerk, approved as to form by the City Attorney and delivered to the Concessionaires and/or Car Rental Companies.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that all resolutions and parts of resolutions in conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby waived.

THOUGH THE TOTAL FUNDS MAY BE TRANSFERRED TO ASSIST WITH ANY OF THESE EFFORTS WITHOUT SPECIFIC LIMITATION; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, like much of the world the United States, the State of Georgia, and the City of Atlanta are currently responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2" and the disease it causes named "coronavirus disease 2019" (abbreviated "COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020 the President of the United States announced a national emergency in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, which included two emergency declarations: one under the National Emergencies Act and one under the Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act; and

WHEREAS, on March 14, 2020 Governor Brian Kemp signed a public health state of emergency to address the COVID-19 pandemic through assisting health and emergency management officials across Georgia by deploying all available resources for the mitigation and treatment of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the outbreak many persons throughout the United States, including in the Metro Atlanta Area, have been confined to their homes in order self-quarantine or are engaging in social distancing in the United States to slow the spread of the COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, many persons may be unable to work due to their children's schools, or their workplaces closing, and the cessation of many public activities to help stop the virus from spreading; and

WHEREAS, these important public health measures have an disproportionate adverse impact on some of our most vulnerable citizens including children who receive food through their school food programs which will be unavailable to them due to school closures; and seniors, who, due to their increased risk of severe illness due to COVID-19 may find themselves isolated and unable to access the food programs usually available to them; and

WHEREAS, these public health measures also have a disproportionate adverse impact on small businesses who anticipate a severe drop in customers and revenue in accordance therewith; and

WHEREAS, likewise, these public health measures may have a severe adverse impact on the incomes of the employees and hourly wage earners of the businesses engaged with the City of Atlanta; and

WHEREAS, in order to contribute to the efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19, the City of Atlanta has instituted a full telework deployment for all non-essential employees; and

WHEREAS, in order to execute this full telework deployment, the purchase of certain technology is necessary to permit the employees affected to continue their work for the City of Atlanta remotely and to support City-wide business continuity efforts; and

WHEREAS, on March 15, 2020, Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms signed Executive Order 2020-06 by which the Chief Financial Officer was ordered to allocate up to seven million dollars (\$7,000,000.00) in funds by transferring general fund uncommitted fund balance for the purpose of providing emergency assistance to those affected by the covid-19 pandemic; the total funds may be utilized as follows: one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to provide emergency assistance to children's food programs, one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to provide emergency assistance to senior food programs, one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to provide emergency assistance to homeless preparedness and response activities, one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) to support small business continuity, one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for the emergency purchase of technology necessary to execute the city's institution of full

telework deployment for all non-essential employees and to support city-wide business continuity, and one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) to assist the city's partners in the financial industry to provide emergency assistance to employees and hourly wage earners of businesses engaged with the City of Atlanta whose incomes are adversely impacted, though the total funds may be transferred to assist with any of these efforts without specific limitation; and

WHEREAS, the funds to support the children's food programs shall be utilized to support breakfast, lunch, and dinner options for affected youth, and the funds to support the senior food programs shall support food options for seniors; and

WHEREAS, the funds to support the homeless preparedness and response activities shall be utilized to support emergency lodging, transportation, and cleaning and sanitation supplies for the homeless population; and

WHEREAS, the funds to support small business continuity shall be utilized to capitalize a small business continuity loan fund; and

WHEREAS, the funds to assist the City's partners in the financial industry to provide emergency assistance to employees and hourly wage earners of businesses engaged with the City of Atlanta whose incomes are adversely impacted shall be utilized to capitalize these efforts.

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Atlanta City Council to ratify Executive Order 2020-06 and to authorize the Chief Financial Officer to allocate up to seven million dollars (\$7,000,000.00) in funds by transferring general fund uncommitted fund balance for the purpose of providing emergency assistance to those affected by the COVID-19 Pandemic.

WHEREAS, City of Atlanta ("City") requires on-call IT services on an as needed basis to support the City's IT systems; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 18-R-3619 entered into Cooperative Purchasing Agreement FC-10408, On-Call IT Services with uWork.com, Inc. DBA Covendis Technologies, Inc. ("Covendis") utilizing Georgia Statewide ("GSW") Contract Number SWC70768 for On-Call IT services in an amount not to exceed Four Hundred Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$400,000.00), adopted by City Council on May 21, 2018 and approved as per City Charter Section 2-403 on May 30, 2018; and

WHEREAS, Covendis provides Atlanta Information Management with temporary information technology ("IT") staffing vendor managed services ("VMS"); and

WHEREAS, the term of the Agreement is for a period of one (1) year with three (3) one (1) year renewal options to be exercised at the City's sole discretion; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 18-R-3836, (adopted by City Council on July 2, 2018 and approved as per City Charter Section 2-403 on July 11, 2018), the City entered into Amendment Number One (1) of Cooperative Purchasing Agreement Number FC-10408 with Covendis for on-call IT by amending FY19 budget to anticipate and appropriate Five Hundred Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$500,000.00) to the General Fund and to authorize the addition of on-call IT services for the Department of Aviation in an amount not to exceed Two Million Dollars and Zero Cents (\$2,000,000.00); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 19-R-3526 (adopted by City Council on May 6, 2019 and approved as per City Charter Section 2-403 on May 15, 2019), the City entered into Amendment Number Two (2) of Cooperative Purchasing Agreement FC-10408 with Covendis for the purpose of adding additional funding for on-call IT services in an amount not to exceed Two Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$2,300,000.00); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance 19-O-1601 (adopted by Council on November 4, 2019 and approved per City Charter Section 2-403 on November 13, 2019), authorized the City to enter into Renewal Term Option Number One (1) and add funding in an amount not to exceed Two Million Dollars and Zero Cents (\$2,000,000.00) effective August 31, 2019 through August 30, 2020 for a period of one (1) year with two (2) remaining one (1) year renewal term options; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Memorandum regarding Teleworking for Non-Essential Employees issued by the Interim Commissioner of Human Resources on March 13, 2020 and as a result of the potential spread

of COVID-19, the City implemented a full telework deployment for all non-essential employees through March 31, 2020; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to City Code of Ordinances Section 2-1192, the Chief Procurement Officer shall make such determination when there exists a threat to public health, welfare or safety under emergency conditions and the procuring agency shall endeavor to utilize existing contracts when addressing an emergency procurement, if appropriate; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to City Code of Ordinances Section 2-1292(b) where emergencies result in potential increased costs exceeding ten percent of the total "not to exceed" cost authorized for the contract, all subsequent contract modifications or change orders that involve additional cost to the City shall be approved by the City Council and Mayor; and

WHEREAS, the City requires additional funding for emergency temporary information technology staffing vendor managed services under Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, FC-10408 to address increased teleworking needs of all non-essential employees; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Procurement Officer and the Chief Information Officer recommend exercising Amendment Number Three (3), of Cooperative Purchasing Agreement FC-10408, On-Call IT Services in accordance with Sections 2-1192 and 2-1292 of Article X, Procurement and Real Estate Code to add additional funding in an amount not to exceed Two Million Five Hundred Sixteen Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$2,516,000.00); and

WHEREAS, the Chief Procurement Officer certified that organizational and personal relationships disclosed by the successful offeror have been considered in accordance with Atlanta City Code Section 2-1214 and that award of the contract is appropriate.

Sidewalk Waiver Request for 1331 Wesley Pkwy NW (SD-18-008)

A sidewalk waiver has been requested by the developer of 1331 Wesley Parkway NW per code section 15-09.003, which reads as follows:

Sidewalk and Curb Improvements

Except as provided herein, sidewalks shall be provided in each subdivision on both sides of existing and proposed streets. The city council may, through an appropriate resolution for each subdivision, waive the foregoing requirement in order to permit the developer of said subdivision to construct sidewalks of equal or greater length along adjoining streets; provided, however, that the city council may grant such a waiver only if the subdivision developer or the pertinent neighborhood planning unit has formally petitioned the city for said waiver, and only if the city council has received formal comments on said petition from the commissioner of public works and the commissioner of planning, development and neighborhood conservation.

The length of the sidewalk required along the front of this subdivision is 202 feet. The Department of Public Works agrees to waive the sidewalk installation requirements along the said frontage, provided that the developer adheres to City Ordinance that will be preparing. Before approval of the final subdivision plat by the Director of Office of Planning for the subdivision SD-18-016 as provided by Sec. 15-07.005 (f)(1), the amount as prescribed by this ordinance shall be paid by the developer, or his successor(s)-in-interest pay \$10,124.95 (ten thousand one hundred twenty-four dollars and nine-five cents) shall be deposited into the district 8 sidewalk fund; and other purposes.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 10, ARTICLE II, SECTION 10-93 OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA CODE OF ORDINANCES SO AS TO PROVIDE AN EXEMPTION FROM THE DISTANCE REQUIREMENTS LISTED IN SECTION 10-88.1 OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR ONE (1) PACKAGE STORE LICENSED TO SELL MALT BEVERAGES, WINE AND/OR DISTILLED SPIRITS AT 3861 ROSWELL ROAD, N.E., AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the City of Atlanta has an interest in maintaining the public safety and welfare of citizens of the City of Atlanta and its visitors; and

WHEREAS, the City of Atlanta has an interest in regulating, through the lawful exercise of its police powers, the sale of alcoholic beverages within its territorial limits; and

WHEREAS, the City of Atlanta is authorized to regulate the locations of establishments which are licensed to sell alcoholic beverages including businesses that sell malt beverages, wine and distilled spirits by the package; and

WHEREAS, Section 10-88.1 of the City of Atlanta Code of Ordinances sets forth the City's distance requirements between businesses seeking licenses to sell alcoholic beverages by the package and other businesses that sell alcoholic beverages by the package, residences, schools, parks, libraries, churches, hospitals and daycare facilities; and

WHEREAS, the operator of a liquor store located at 3906 Roswell Road, NE wishes to move its liquor store approximately 1,000 feet to the property located at 3861 Roswell Road, NE; and

WHEREAS, this move will allow the liquor store operator to offer an expanded line of products and shopping opportunities for neighborhood residents, residents of the city of Atlanta and visitors to the city of Atlanta; and

WHEREAS, while the property at 3861 Roswell Road, NE has been licensed to sell alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises for many years, the 3861 Roswell Road, NE property is not eligible for an alcohol license to operate a liquor store because it is too close to nearby single family homes; and

WHEREAS, a majority of the single family residential owners whose properties abut 3861 Roswell Road, NE, have issued their written support to move the liquor store from 3906 Roswell Road, NE to 3861 Roswell Road, NE; and

WHEREAS, it would be in the best interest of the City of Atlanta to create an exemption from the current distance requirements in 10-88.1 to promote the move of the liquor store from 3906 Roswell Road, NE to 3861 Roswell Road, NE;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That Chapter 10, Article II, Section 10-93 of the City of Atlanta Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by deleting Section 10-93 (b) in its entirety and replacing it with the following new Section 10-93 (b) which shall read as follows:

Sec. 10-93. - Exemptions for the sale of alcoholic beverages by the package.

- (b) Any applicant for a license to sell alcoholic beverages, including beer, wine and distilled spirits, by the package within the following areas shall not be required to comply with the distance requirements set forth in Section 10-88.1 of the City Code of Ordinances:
 - (1) If the applicant for such license and the location for which the license is being sought meets the following requirements:
 - a. At the time of filing the application for a license, the applicant for the license to sell alcoholic beverages by the package, or his agent, must have been issued a license to sell alcoholic beverages by the package within the past 12 months in an establishment located within SPI 16;
 - b. The applicant or his agent has filed an application for a license to sell alcoholic beverages by the package at a new location within SPI 16 because the business can no longer be operated at the former location due to either the planned demolition or reconstruction of the building within which the establishment was located; and
 - c. The new location for which a license to sell alcoholic beverages is being sought lies within the following area:

WHEREAS, like much of the world the United States, the State of Georgia, and the City of Atlanta are currently responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named "SARS-CoV-2" and the disease it causes named "coronavirus disease 2019" (abbreviated "COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020 the President of the United States announced a national emergency in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, which included two emergency declarations: one under the National Emergencies Act and one under the Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act; and

WHEREAS, on March 14, 2020 Governor Brian Kemp signed a public health state of emergency to address the COVID-19 pandemic through assisting health and emergency management officials across Georgia by deploying all available resources for the mitigation and treatment of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the outbreak many persons throughout the United States, including in the Metro Atlanta Area, have been confined to their homes in order self-quarantine or are engaging in social distancing in the United States to slow the spread of the COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, many persons may be unable to work due to their children's schools, or their workplaces closing, and the cessation of many public activities to help stop the virus from spreading; and

WHEREAS, these important public health measures have an disproportionate adverse impact on some of our most vulnerable citizens including children who receive food through their school food programs which will be unavailable to them due to school closures; and seniors, who, due to their increased risk of severe illness due to COVID-19 may find themselves isolated and unable to access the food programs usually available to them; and

WHEREAS, these public health measures also have a disproportionate adverse impact on small businesses who anticipate a severe drop in customers and revenue in accordance therewith; and

WHEREAS, likewise, these public health measures may have a severe adverse impact on the incomes of the employees and hourly wage earners of the businesses engaged with the City of Atlanta; and

WHEREAS, in order to contribute to the efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19, the City of Atlanta has instituted a full telework deployment for all non-essential employees; and

WHEREAS, in order to execute this full telework deployment, the purchase of certain technology is necessary to permit the employees affected to continue their work for the City of Atlanta remotely and to support City-wide business continuity efforts; and

WHEREAS, on March 15, 2020, Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms signed Executive Order 2020-06 by which the Chief Financial Officer was ordered to allocate up to seven million dollars (\$7,000,000.00) in funds by transferring general fund uncommitted fund balance for the purpose of providing emergency assistance to those affected by the covid-19 pandemic; the total funds may be utilized as follows: one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to provide emergency assistance to children's food programs, one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to provide emergency assistance to senior food programs, one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to provide emergency assistance to homeless preparedness and response activities, one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) to support small business continuity, one million dollars

(\$1,000,000.00) for the emergency purchase of technology necessary to execute the city's institution of full telework deployment for all non-essential employees and to support city-wide business continuity, and one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) to assist the city's partners in the financial industry to provide emergency assistance to employees and hourly wage earners of businesses engaged with the City of Atlanta whose incomes are adversely impacted, though the total funds may be transferred to assist with any of these efforts without specific limitation; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, the Atlanta City Council ratified the Executive Order and authorized the Chief Financial Officer to make the allocations described therein; and

WHEREAS, the funds to support the children's food programs shall be utilized to support breakfast, lunch, and dinner options for affected youth, and the funds to support the senior food programs shall support food options for seniors; and

WHEREAS, the funds to support the homeless preparedness and response activities shall be utilized to support emergency lodging, transportation, and cleaning and sanitation supplies for the homeless population; and

WHEREAS, the funds to support small business continuity shall be utilized to capitalize a small business continuity loan fund; and

WHEREAS, the funds to assist the City's partners in the financial industry to provide emergency assistance to employees and hourly wage earners of businesses engaged with the City of Atlanta whose incomes are adversely impacted shall be utilized to capitalize these efforts.

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has recommended the creation of a cost center on the City's financial system to account for expenditures related to the provision of emergency assistance to those affected by the COVID-19 Pandemic; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Atlanta City Council to transfer from anticipations and to appropriations the funds to support the expenditures related to the provision of emergency assistance to those affected by the COVID-19 Pandemic.

WHEREAS, the Department of Finance has established estimates for the Fiscal Year 2021 budget (July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021); and

WHEREAS, the Budget Commission is responsible for setting the budget revenue anticipations in preparation of the annual budget and will do so in accordance with Section 6-301 of the City Charter; and

WHEREAS, the Budget Commission will establish revenue estimates for Fiscal Year 2021; and

WHEREAS, the General Ledger maintained by the Finance Department is the official financial book of record for the City of Atlanta; and

WHEREAS, the Oracle Cloud Projects & Grants cube exists as a separate financial cube for certain project and grants; and

WHEREAS, appropriations are set at the project level for Capital, Grants and Trusts Funds, the General Ledger remains the official book of record; and

WHEREAS, the appropriations of budgets herein must first be established in the Oracle Cloud Projects & Grants' cube and interfaced with the Oracle Cloud General Ledger cube; and

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Year 2021 budget has been balanced; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor has submitted the Fiscal Year 2021 budget recommendations.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA, HEREBY ORDAINS as follows:

SECTION1: That the following revenue anticipations, as set by the Budget Commission, shall be used for:

WHEREAS, the City of Atlanta (the "City") is required to submit to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Atlanta's 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan and 2020 Annual Action Plan for receipt of the 2020 four (4) entitlement grants; and

WHEREAS, the 2020 Annual Action Plan includes project allocations for the following entitlement grants: 1) the Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG"); 2) the Emergency Solutions Grant ("ESG"); 3) the HOME Investment Partnership Program Grant ("HOME"); and 4) the Housing Opportunities for Person with AIDS Grant ("HOPWA"), (collectively, the "Entitlement Grants"); and

WHEREAS, the City of Atlanta (City) has received notification of funds from HUD and must anticipate and appropriate funding of \$7,156,340 in the 2020 CDBG (Community Development Fund) Budget, \$627,336 in the 2020 ESG (Community Development Fund-ESG) Budget, and funding of \$2,113,138 in the 2020 HOME (HOME Investment Trust Fund) Budget and \$1,500,000 of Home Program Income (HOME Investment Trust Fund) Budget and funding of \$22,795,464 in the 2020 Intergovernmental Grant Fund

WHEREAS, the City received notification from HUD dated February 19, 2020 which sets forth the Fiscal Year 2020 allocation of Entitlement Grants funding to the City ("**HUD Notification**" attached hereto as Exhibit A); and

WHEREAS, the Department of Grants and Community Development recommend that the 2020 Entitlement Grants awards be distributed amongst the Department of Grants and Community, Atlanta Police Department, Department of Parks and Recreation, Department of Finance, Municipal Courts and the Department of Planning and Community Development in the amounts set forth ("Grant Amount") in the Attachments 1-4 and;

WHEREAS, the necessary environmental clearances have been obtained from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and

WHEREAS, HUD authorizes the City of Atlanta pre-award costs based on its program year of January 1, 2020-December 31, 2020. Costs incurred prior to the effective date of the Federal award directly pursuant to the

negotiation and in anticipation of the Federal award where such costs are necessary for efficient and timely performance of the scope of work. Such costs are allowable only to the extent that they would have been allowable if incurred after the date of the Federal award and only with the written approval (CPD Notice) of the Federal awarding agency.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA, HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That the 2020 Community Development Fund Budget, the 2020 Intergovernmental Budget and the 2020 HOME Investment Fund Budget be and are hereby amended as shown on the Attachments 1-4.

Section 2: That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby waived to the extent of the conflict.

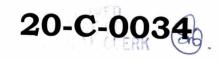

I have been actively involved in reproductive rights issues since 1986, when I became one of the founding members of APAC (Atlanta Pro Choice Action Committee).

APAC was founded as a response to the massive wave of Operation Rescue clinic blockades, which started here during the Democratic Convention. Our purpose was assisting women's clinics by organizing and training volunteers to assist with clients safely entering and leaving the premises through large protest groups. We also monitored protest activity and protest organizers outside the clinics for safety of clinic staff and clients, notifying the authorities if the situation became unsafe. Later we also arranged a volunteer driver for women who had no one to accompany them to the clinic, provided a hotel room if needed and helped with gas money for transportation. At APAC, we also did education of the public around reproductive rights through outreach at public events. This activity covered 1988 – 2015.

I worked as a counselor and also handled client intake at Feminist Women's Health Service from 1996 – 1998

I was a BoD member of Georgians for Choice for 8 years, helping to coordinate lobbying efforts around reproductive rights issues. In addition, I served as the Project Coordinator at Georgians for Choice from 1999 – 2000. When the Executive Director left in early 1999, I served as an acting Director until a new ED could be hired in late 1999.

I was very proud to be awarded the first "Margie Pitts Hames Advocacy" Award presented by GARAL (Georgia Abortion & Reproductive Rights Action League) in 1995.

Margie Pitts Hames was the Atlanta civil rights lawyer who argued the abortion rights case of Doe v Bolton before the US Supreme Court.

During the period of 1998 – 1999 I assisted Dr. Chudi Nwawka in opening the first women's clinic in Lawrenceville, GA.

I assisted in research for the book "The Wrath of Angels – The American Abortion War" by Judy Thomas & James Risen (published in 1998).

As a lifetime activist and organizer for lifetime for the cause of securing reproductive rights for women today, I remain committed to this cause today and would be honored if appointed to the newly formed Reproductive Rights Committee.

A RESOLUTION CALLING ON THE CITY OF ATLANTA PLANNING DEPARTMENT TO REFER MATTERS REGARDING AMENDMENTS TO THE CITY'S COMPREHENSIVE DEVELOPMENT PLAN TO ALL NPUS THAT MAY BE AFFECTED BY THEM

WHEREAS, the 25 Neighborhood Planning Units (NPUs) are the official organized citizen advisory input groups for the City of Atlanta, and the Atlanta Planning Advisory Board (APAB) is the umbrella group made up of the NPUs; and

WHEREAS, the city of Atlanta has a Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP) that includes intended future landuse for specific areas and parcels among other things; and

WHEREAS, changes to the future land-use designations for parcels within an NPU, whether they are made for proactive reasons or to accommodate a specific rezoning request, are referred to that NPU as business items prior to the public hearings on these matters; and

WHEREAS, the relationship between future land-use and zoning is defined by the land-use compatibility table that is also an element of the CDP; and

WHEREAS, changes to the land-use compatibility table can have essentially the same effect as changes to future land-use designations as they will either accommodate a particular rezoning or preclude that rezoning unless it is accompanied by an amendment to the CDP that specifically permits it; and

WHEREAS, changes to the land-use compatibility table may thereby affect several NPU's; and

WHEREAS, the land use compatibility table has been modified in the past without public input via the NPU system*;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the membership of The Atlanta Planning Advisory Board (APAB) in the City of Atlanta, Georgia;

That APAB calls upon the City of Atlanta to refer changes to the land-use compatibility table to all of those NPUs that may be impacted by the changes as business items prior to the public hearing dates for these matters and that NPU recommendations be communicated to the Atlanta City Council in a timely manner.

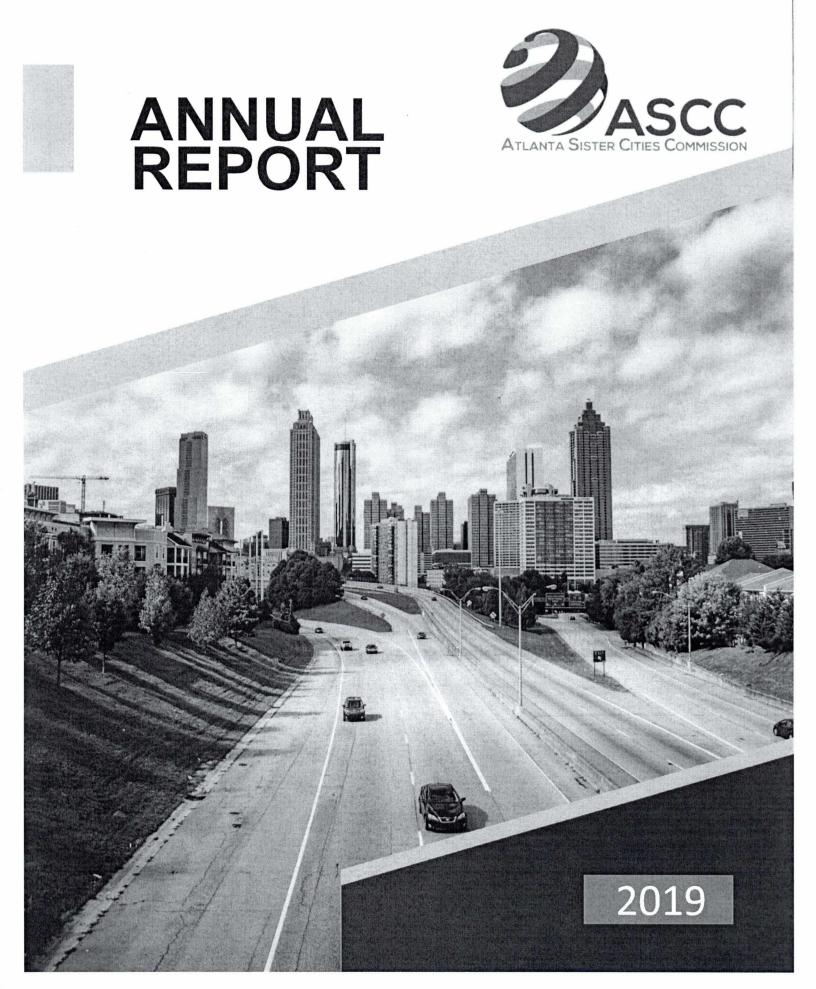

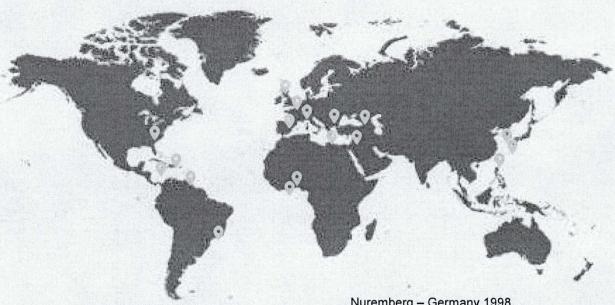

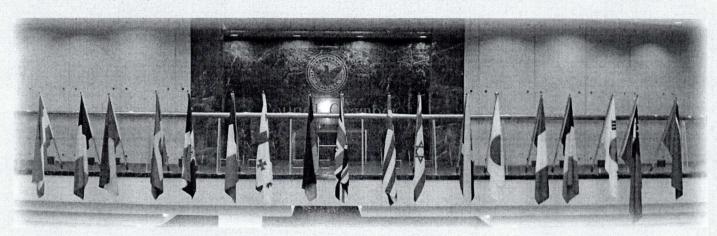

Through these programs, and many others, Atlanta's sister cities activities contribute nearly \$100 million to the local economy through business and trade, tourism, education, and cultural programs.

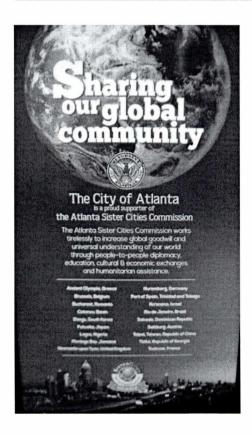
Chairman's Letter

The full 'board' of the Commission comprises the Chair, three additional Mayoral appointees and two members appointed by the City Council. In addition, the chairpersons of each Sister City Committee, or their designee, serve on the Commission.

Elections are held annually to select a Vice Chair, a Secretary and a Treasurer. Each elected officer serves a one-year term. Elected officials of the Commission are restricted to two consecutive terms in office.

The Commission is supported by members of the Mayor's Office staff who participate in monthly and special meetings, help shape the Commission's policy and act as liaison with the Mayor.

ASCC maintains a web site with annual reports, information on each of the sister cities and details of the process of becoming a sister city.

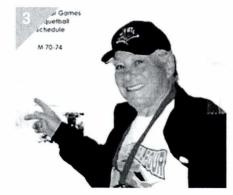

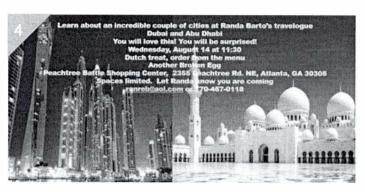
